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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 12th Edition of the Sankalp Africa Summit, hosted on February 26–27, 2025, at the Edge Convention Centre in Nairobi, convened 971 delegates from 41 countries, reinforcing its position as Africa's leading platform for entrepreneurship and impact investing. The summit successfully broadened its reach, attracting new voices, fostering cross-sector partnerships, and mobilizing capital to scale solutions designed to solve Africa's most pressing challenges.

Under the theme "Scaling Africa's Entrepreneurs," the summit featured 32 high-impact sessions addressing Climate & Clean Energy, Agriculture & Food Security, Circular and Regenerative Economy, Health & Nutrition, and Gender & Livelihoods. These discussions catalyzed funding commitments, shaped conversations, and strengthened investor-entrepreneur connections. Entrepreneurs actively engaged with investors through structured networking, investor roundtables, and curated dealrooms, resulting in multiple funding commitments, including four entrepreneurs securing investment on the spot through the ASCEND Program.

The Sankalp Africa Awards 2025 continued to showcase high-impact enterprises driving transformative change across sectors. This year's winners included **Kilimo Fresh**, **BenaCare**, **Dawa Mkononi**, and **Organic Fields Ltd.**, each offering scalable solutions in food security, healthcare, medicine distribution, and circular agriculture.

A key milestone at this year's summit was the introduction of a dedicated health track, strengthening investment and innovation in Africa's healthcare sector. With support from Villgro Africa, Boehringer Ingelheim, Grand Challenges Canada, Health Finance Coalition, and others, this track amplified discussions on sustainable health business models and financing mechanisms for health-focused entrepreneurs.

The summit also welcomed new strategic partnerships, with the African Development Bank, Challenge Fund for Youth Employment, EHA Impact Ventures, Launch Africa Ventures, Viridian, and NaiBAN playing a pivotal role in supporting entrepreneurs and mobilizing investment for scalable African businesses.

Beyond investments and partnerships, The Sankalp Africa Summit 2025 introduced key announcements that underscored its commitment to driving impact, including:

- The launch of the Ennova System by AfDB, leveraging AI to provide real-time data insights for startups.
- Villgro Africa's 10-year impact milestone, showcasing its track record of deploying catalytic funding for African healthcare innovators.
- The expansion of We-Fi's WE Finance Code to Kenya, aimed at improving financial access for women-led enterprises.

The Sankalp Africa Summit edition reaffirmed its role as a catalyst for scaling African enterprises, unlocking investment, and shaping the continent's sustainable future.
























MEDIA COVERAGE

PROGRAM AND CONTENT

THEME OF THE SANKALP AFRICA SUMMIT 2025: SCALING AFRICA'S ENTREPRENEURS

The 12th Sankalp Africa Summit brought together Africa's entrepreneurial ecosystem under the theme "Scaling Africa's Entrepreneurs", addressing the continent's most pressing challenges while highlighting opportunities for transformative growth.

Sub-Saharan Africa continues to face a unique spectrum of challenges - from food insecurity and climate vulnerabilities, to limited access to healthcare, and inclusive and equitable quality education. These issues have been further compounded by rapid urbanization and a growing youth population in need of economic opportunities. Yet, amidst these challenges lies immense potential. Across the continent, entrepreneurs are emerging as changemakers, tackling some of the most critical problems with bold innovations and sustainable business models.

Throughout the summit, attendees witnessed stories of transformation from renewable energy startups that bring affordable and clean energy to rural communities, reducing reliance on fossil fuels while enhancing livelihoods. AgriTech enterprises demonstrated how they equip farmers with digital tools to boost productivity and combat climate shocks. Healthcare innovators showcased their efforts to extend access to quality care through telemedicine and localized solutions. These stories went beyond survival, offering blueprints for a brighter, more resilient Africa.

However, scaling these transformative solutions has not been without hurdles. African entrepreneurs continue to encounter systemic barriers that stifle their growth and limit their impact. The first and most pervasive challenge remains the lack of capital. Despite Sub-Saharan Africa receiving \$4.8 billion in venture funding in 2022—accounting for just 1% of global venture capital investment—many businesses still find themselves underfunded.

Second, a significant talent gap persists. As demand for skilled workers in African startups rises, with sectors like technology seeing double-digit growth annually, many companies struggle to find affordable, qualified personnel. For instance, 40% of African CEOs continue to cite a lack of skilled talent as a major constraint, forcing startups to seek lower-cost workers who may lack the necessary expertise, thereby limiting operational effectiveness. Finally, limited access to networks continues to isolate entrepreneurs, with fewer than 30% reporting adequate access to mentorship opportunities critical for scaling their businesses.

The Sankalp Africa Summit 2025 addressed these challenges head-on, providing a dynamic platform for Africa's entrepreneurs to thrive. The summit convened a vibrant ecosystem of investors, thought leaders, service providers, and entrepreneurs, ensuring that every stakeholder was left equipped with actionable insights, meaningful connections, and renewed inspiration.

Key Outcomes of the Summit

 Igniting Transformative Growth: The summit equipped entrepreneurs with actionable knowledge, strategic insights, and cutting-edge tools to refine their business models and scale with confidence.
 Through masterclasses, peer exchanges, and expert-led workshops, the Summit catalyzed a transformational wave of entrepreneurial excellence.



- Building a Movement for Capital Access: By bringing together the entire investment supply chain, the summit bridged financing gaps and drove a collective movement to channel capital into the hands of Africa's most promising changemakers. It went beyond matchmaking, redesigning how capital flows to fund solutions for the continent's most critical challenges.
- Creating a Community of Champions: The summit aimed to ensure that every entrepreneur met a champion—be it a mentor, investor, advocate, or skilled partner who believed in their vision. This ecosystem of support was designed to amplify their impact and foster lasting connections that extended beyond the event, enabling collaboration and nurturing their journey toward success.

SANKALP AFRICA SUMMIT STRUCTURED AGENDA

The Sankalp Africa Summit 2025 convened a vibrant ecosystem of impact-driven entrepreneurs, investors, policymakers, and thought leaders to shape Africa's economic future. Designed for interaction and insight, the agenda featured 32 diverse sessions—from keynotes to showcases—led by 172 speakers across sectors like renewable energy, agriculture, digital finance, and healthcare.


Entrepreneurs were not just participants, but co-creators of the conversation, bringing forward innovative solutions and lived experiences. The summit embraced a range of session formats including keynote speeches, panel discussions, masterclasses, roundtables, and showcases, fostering a dynamic, inclusive, and action-oriented learning environment.

Here's a glimpse of the insightful discussions featured topics:

Health, Nutrition and Sanitation

Scaling Care: Unlocking Africa's Health Innovation Potential | Hosted by Villgro Africa.

This session explored how healthcare startups can overcome growth and fundraising barriers in Africa. It emphasized the importance of investment readiness—through preparation, credibility, and ecosystem support—as a pathway to scale. The conversation unpacked strategies to build investor confidence and ensure long-term impact across the continent.



This session examined the barriers to accessible and scalable primary healthcare in Africa, from limited insurance coverage to workforce shortages and fragmented systems. Speakers emphasized the need for innovative business models that integrate technology, human-centered design, policy reform, and strategic partnerships. The conversation also addressed funding gaps and proposed solutions such as leveraging research, expanding digital tools, and strengthening cross-sector collaboration to drive long-term sustainability.

3. Next-Gen Healers: Empowering Youth to Fill Africa's Health Workforce Gap | Hosted by Villgro Africa.

This session addressed the urgent need to close Africa's health workforcegap by equipping youth with relevant skills and opportunities. Speakers highlighted systemic barriers including outdated training, limited job awareness, and over-reliance on traditional roles. The discussion spotlighted entrepreneurship as a key pathway—through telemedicine, home-based care, and supply chains—to expand the sector. Recommendations included aligning curricula with industry needs, boosting hands—on training, streamlining certifications, and encouraging youth—led health innovations.















Agriculture and food security

Food Security: Scaling Catalytic Funding for Enhanced Food Security | Hosted by Good Food Innovation Fund.

This session focused on innovative financing approaches to tackle Africa's food security challenges. Moderated by Intellecap and The Rockefeller Foundation, the discussion emphasized the need to scale catalytic funding to drive sustainable agricultural transformation. Stakeholders explored impact-driven funding models designed to bridge financing gaps and support food systems innovation across the continent.



This session explored the critical role of African SMEs in improving nutrition and reducing malnutrition across the continent. With SMEs responsible for over 50% of Africa's caloric intake, the discussion focused on business models that deliver nutritious food to low-income consumers while remaining financially viable. Panelists highlighted investment strategies and cross-sector collaboration as key enablers for scaling impact. The session underscored how, with the right support, SMEs can transform nutrition outcomes and strengthen food security.









Circular and Regenerative Economy

Localizing the Loop: Developing Place-Based Circular Economy Models for Africa | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session explored how Africa can adopt place-based circular economy (PBCE) models rooted in local realities rather than imported frameworks. Discussions focused on addressing climate change, biodiversity loss, and inequality through coordinated efforts involving businesses, communities, and governments. Highlighted initiatives included Circular Apparel Innovation Factory, Circular Cities, and Circular Food Systems, which aim to build local resilience, create green jobs, and enable MSMEs to adopt sustainable practices.

2. Circular Economy Catalysts: Community Innovations Driving Sustainable Impact in Africa

This session spotlighted grassroots circular economy solutions tackling waste and sustainability while generating economic opportunity. Organizations like VSO Waste Management and Ocean Cause Kenya shared real-world models, emphasizing the need for blended financing, risk mitigation, and policy support. A major theme was the supply-demand gap in recycled materials and the role of progressive government policies in enabling growth, with Kenya's plastic waste reforms cited as a strong example.









Climate and Clean Energy

Localizing the Global: Adapting Climate Innovations to Africa's Unique Needs | Hosted by Energy Catalyst.

This session focused on tailoring global climate innovations to Africa's realities. Panelists emphasized impact-linked financing, local capital, and patient investment to support scalable solutions. Case studies from Ethiopia, Ghana, and Kenya illustrated the role of policy in accelerating innovation. Speakers called for deeper collaboration, stronger local finance ecosystems, and blended finance models to advance climate solutions across the continent.

2. Unlocking the Role of Philanthropy in Africa's Climate Future | Hosted by Shakti Foundation.

This session highlighted how philanthropy can bridge gaps in climate finance, especially for high-impact adaptation projects. Discussions covered nature-based solutions, policy engagement, and capacity building for enterprises and governments. Key insights included leveraging carbon credits, moving innovations from pilot to scale, and fostering partnerships to strengthen Africa's climate resilience.

3. Pathways to Zero: De-carbonizing Africa's Industries for a Competitive Future | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session explored how Africa can decarbonize its industries while remaining economically competitive. Speakers emphasized the need for clean energy investments, local entrepreneurship, and supportive regulation. Key discussions included hydrogen for heavy industry, green steel, and financial instruments to accelerate adoption of low-carbon technologies.

4. Carbon Currency: Turning Emissions into Investments | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session unpacked how carbon credits can be leveraged as financial assets to attract investment and drive sustainability. Discussions highlighted the role of initiatives like FSD in supporting small-scale developers through advisory and finance. The session stressed the importance of enabling policies, innovative financing models, and stakeholder collaboration for a thriving carbon economy.

5. Gimmick vs. Value: What Should E-Mobility Investors Focus On? | Community Session led by Ampersand.

As e-mobility gains ground in Africa, this session dissected what truly matters for investors. Speakers examined the rise of startups amidst dropping battery prices and progressive policies in Rwanda and Ethiopia. The conversation tackled equity capital shortages, fragmented strategies, and tech gimmicks, urging investors to focus on scalable, value-driven innovations over hype.

6. Greening the Deal: Enabling a Climate Finance Facility in Africa | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session explored the creation of a centralized climate finance facility to streamline capital deployment in Africa. Key focus areas included risk mitigation, easier capital access, and knowledge sharing. Drawing from global best practices, the session emphasized structured, inclusive approaches to fund climate solutions and support sustainable development across the region.

Gender, Livelihoods and Youth Employment

Results That Matter: Scaling Youth Employment Through
 Outcome-Based Financing | Hosted by Challenge Fund for
 Youth Employment

This session explored how outcome-based financing models are driving measurable youth employment across Africa. With a target of 230,000 jobs by 2026, CFYE shared strategies like results-based grants and structured models for sustainable employment. Panelists emphasized the role of financial incentives in enhancing accountability, promoting gender inclusion, and aligning investments with social impact.

2. Female Founder Showcase: Unlocking Market Potential | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session spotlighted 10 women-led businesses across Africa, offering them a platform to pitch to investors and partners. The showcase highlighted the innovative ways female founders are addressing livelihood challenges, while pursuing both financial returns and social impact.

3. Leveraging Climate Finance for Gender-Responsive Clean Cooking Solutions | Hosted by IDRC and Convergence.

This session examined how climate finance can support gender-responsive clean cooking solutions. Panelists discussed the intersection of clean energy, gender equity, and climate action, emphasizing the need for innovative financing, data-driven approaches, and cross-sector collaboration to scale impact and enhance women's economic empowerment.

4. Women @ Sankalp | Hosted by Intellecap.

This interactive session focused on emotional well-being and empowerment for women. Through reflective exercises and shared experiences, participants explored personal barriers and found renewed purpose. The session underscored the value of safe spaces, emotional release, and collective healing in building resilient women leaders.

Creative Economy


Masterpiece in Motion: Advancing Culture and Creative Entrepreneurship in Africa | Community Session led by Beaux Monde and Wylde International

This session explored the untapped potential of Africa's \$50B creative economy, addressing challenges like limited funding and policy gaps. Case studies from Beaux Monde, Kenya Fashion Week, and Muse Money showcased innovative solutions around mentorship, financial literacy, and global market access. Speakers called for better financial models, policy support, and stronger ecosystem linkages to fuel sector growth.



1. Start-Up Fundraising Reality Check: Am I Chasing the Wrong Investors? | Hosted by Miller Center for Social Entrepreneurship.

This session equipped entrepreneurs with tools to approach fundraising strategically. Speakers broke down four key elements of a funding ask—type of capital, amount, use of funds, and investor return—and stressed the importance of storytelling, clarity, and alignment with investor goals to increase chances of securing investment.



This session explored how tech and innovation can drive startup scalability across Africa. Discussions covered barriers such as funding gaps and weak digital infrastructure, and proposed solutions like Startup Bills, ecosystem collaboration, and stronger product-market fit to build globally competitive ventures.

3. Boardrooms & Bottom Lines: Corporate Governance Made Simple | Hosted by FSD Uganda.

This session demystified corporate governance for startups, emphasizing its role in transparency, leadership, and investor confidence. Key takeaways included structuring governance systems, defining roles, and hiring ethically. Governance was reframed as a growth enabler, not just a compliance function.

4. Funders Review: A Townhall for Entrepreneurs | Community Session led by Sunlight Review.

This townhall connected entrepreneurs with aligned funders, offering guidance on refining investment messaging and navigating funding challenges. The session encouraged collaboration and shared insights to build sustainable, mission-driven ventures.























Sell Like a Boss: Masterclass for Women Entrepreneurs | Community Session led by Her Dream Career.

This hands-on session taught women how to master the sales process—from goal-setting to negotiation. Speakers highlighted the power of storytelling, inbound and outbound sales strategies, and leveraging digital tools for growth. Persistence and clarity were emphasized as keys to success.



Exclusive Sessions for Investors

1. Uganda Deal Room | Hosted by FSD Uganda.

This session showcased high-potential Ugandan enterprises to investors. Through live pitches and discussions, it facilitated connections and unlocked capital for scale-ready businesses in key sectors.



2. Roundtable with Investors | Hosted by Energy Catalyst.

This roundtable discussed Africa's energy financing gap, investor risk concerns, and early-stage funding challenges. Capacity-building programs and investor readiness tools were proposed as pathways to unlock more capital for the energy sector.



3. Climate Finance Roundtable | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session addressed barriers to climate finance in Africa, calling for inclusive funding models, better regional collaboration, and carbon market readiness. Gender equity, flexible capital, and stronger Global South leadership were emphasized as accelerators of sustainable investment.



4. Deep Tech Showcase | Hosted by Intellecap.

This session explored how AI, robotics, and biotech are solving critical African challenges across healthcare, finance, and logistics. Entrepreneurs shared how strategic scaling, policy alignment, and investment in R&D are vital to building Africa's deep tech future.



5. Making More Health Together: Showcase of Health Innovators | Hosted by Villgro Africa.

This high-energy pitch session featured health startups presenting to investor judges. Founders gained feedback and exposure, while investors explored emerging innovations shaping Africa's health future.





UNSTRUCTURED AGENDA AT THE SANKALP AFRICA SUMMIT 2025

Beyond the structured sessions, the **Sankalp Africa Summit 2025** embraced an **'unstructured agenda'**, inviting the community to take charge of crafting and leading their own discussions within an unconference framework. This segment epitomized Sankalp's core value of **amplifying diverse voices** within the ecosystem, fostering organic, participant-driven exchanges on topics that matter most to the community.

This dynamic and engaging networking space was shaped by organizations that took the lead in hosting their own sessions, offering grassroots-level insights and fostering a collaborative atmosphere. The eclectic mix of discussions included:

- Built to Help, But Struggling to Succeed: The Hidden Barriers of Impact Incubation led by Pollinate Impact
- · How Can Incubators and Accelerators Stay Relevant? facilitated by Villgro Africa
- WE Finance Code: Empowering Women Entrepreneurs organized by The World Bank
- · Scaling Renewable Energy SMEs across Africa presented by Intellecap

These self-organized sessions enriched the summit with real-world perspectives and innovative ideas, reinforcing the commitment to democratizing knowledge sharing. This session reframed entrepreneurship in Africa as a movement toward ownership, dignity, and innovation—built from within and backed by systems that are aligned to the continent's realities. It set a bold tone for the summit: one that embraces the power of local solutions, values-driven leadership, and a future authored by African entrepreneurs themselves.



DAY 2: OPENING PLENARY | THE MISSING TRILLION: BRIDGING THE GENDER INVESTMENT GAP FOR WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS

The second day of the Sankalp Africa Summit 2025 opened with a powerful conversation addressing one of the most urgent blind spots in Africa's entrepreneurship ecosystem: the gender investment gap. Despite driving innovation and impact across sectors, women-led businesses received just 1% of all startup funding in 2024—a stark decline from previous years. Startups with female CEOs secured only 2%, highlighting how deeply entrenched the gap remains.

This session moved beyond intent and rhetoric, offering concrete strategies to convert commitment into capital—and to ensure that women are not merely applauded for their resilience but actively funded to scale.

Panel Discussion

The panel discussion aimed to move from **intent to action** by exploring actionable strategies that investors and capital providers can implement to address the gender investment gap. Moderated by **Karnika Yadav**, **Intellecap**, the session delved into successful models that are already driving change, while examining the critical roles that financial institutions, governments, and venture capitalists play in bridging this gap. **Watch Day 2's Opening Plenary here**.

Susan underscored that gender inclusion isn't a moral argument—it's an economic one. Women reinvest in communities, build employment, and lead in sectors that drive social transformation. Investing in them makes bottom—line sense.

This plenary didn't just spotlight the funding gap—it interrogated the systems that sustain it. From the informality of women-led businesses and limited networks to restrictive ticket sizes and unconscious bias in decision-making rooms, the message was clear: the gender financing gap isn't a women's issue—it's a systemic one. Bridging it demands more than pledges. It calls for new investment models, measurable impact, and inclusive design thinking. Women are already building resilient, high-impact businesses—now the ecosystem must dismantle the barriers that keep them underfunded and underestimated.





SUSTAINABILITY AT SANKALP

At the Sankalp Africa Summit 2025, we took a significant step toward environmental sustainability by launching a tree planting initiative aimed at offsetting the carbon emissions from the event. Committed to planting seven trees for each of the 971 attendees, our goal is to plant a total of 7,000 trees. We collaborated with the Oloolua Forest Ecotourism Community Based Organization, leveraging their expertise for the detailed logistical planning necessary to ensure the success of our initiative. This includes the procurement of saplings, and the mapping and allocation of resources. To optimize the impact of our efforts, we will adopt the Miyawaki method, a technique developed by Japanese forest ecologist Akira Miyawaki, which is known for enhancing biodiversity and ecosystem resilience by simulating the natural growth of forests. This method involves intensive site preparation, including sustained weed removal for three years post-planting. We are grateful for the invaluable support from We collaborated with the Oloolua Forest Ecotourism Community Based Organization, local communities, all Sankalp Africa Summit 2025 attendees and Aavishkaar Group team members employees whose collective effort made this initiative a success.
